SUBJECT: Municipal Support for Community Led Events

ORIGIN

October 1, 2024, Meeting of Regional Council (Item 15.8.1):

MOVED by Councillor Russell Seconded by Councillor Blackburn

THAT Halifax Regional Council direct the Chief Administrative Officer to write a staff report that:

1. Creates a policy/framework that provides clear criteria and a rationale for determining which significant events should be included in the annual municipal event calendar and be managed, either wholly or partially, by the municipality.
2. Conducts a full review of the current annual event calendar and propose changes to the existing events based on new policy and framework.
3. Investigates and propose methods of support for significant community-led events, such as the Sackville Tree Lighting ceremony. Support could include but not be limited to; funding options, in-kind resources, insurance provision, promotional assistance and streamlined permitting processes to help facilitate these important community events.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The report reviews the background of municipally delivered events and describes currently delivered events. To streamline resources and enhance impact, new criteria for Municipally Delivered Events (MDE) are proposed to prioritize inclusivity, alignment with municipal goals, and regional benefits.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that Halifax Regional Council:

1. approve the criteria, set forth in the Discussion section of this report, that an event must meet in order for the event to be considered in the Annual Calendar of Municipally Delivered Events; and
2. approve the Annual Calendar of Municipally Delivered Events as set forth in Table 2 in the

Discussion section of this report.

BACKGROUND

The HRM Events team supports over 150 events annually through grants and/or municipal services through the Special Events Task Force (SETF). Three Senior Civic Event staff directly deliver 15 Festivals or events which leads to 50+ event days programmed in the Municipally Delivered Event calendar.

Historically, events organized by the municipality have been assigned through different methods such as; being grandfathered at the time of amalgamation, direction from senior management or based on direction from Council.

In 2015, the staff report on [Special events Grant Process - Administrative Orders](#) indicated that events under the direct care and control of HRM Civic Event staff would be defined as "regional operational" events. These were civic events for which:

- HRM assumes the risk and liability;
- HRM civic event staff organize and deliver;
- Budgets are held internally within the HRM SAP accounting system;
- Occur annually and the duration of event activities is no longer than 5 days;
- Provide benefits such as local media coverage, economic and business benefit, promotes HRM within the event's marketing campaign;
- Are accessible and attractive to people of all ages, ethnicity, and cultural background; and
- Program supports a national or regional landmark occasion.

To align with the above, staff recommended the phasing out of Bedford Days and the Dartmouth Tree lighting as municipally delivered events, with a view to these becoming community led events. On May 26, 2015, Regional Council approved the "Regional Events and Cultural Initiatives Operational Event Programs criteria and realignment" but directed the retention of Bedford Days and the Dartmouth Tree Lighting as municipally delivered events. These would be considered legacy events as the care and control from the beginning of the event was the responsibility of the Municipality.

Annual Event Calendar of Municipally Delivered Events

HRM currently operates 11 regional-scale events and 4 culturally significant events in collaboration with the Office of Diversity & Inclusion (D&I). The current MDE's are listed below in chronological order and more details on these events are found in **Attachment 1**:

1. National Indigenous People's Day*
2. Bedford Days
3. **Summer Event Series (40 additional event days since 2019)**
4. KANA'TA: HFX Canada Day*
5. Emancipation Day / Freedom Festival*
6. Natal Day Weekend
7. Acadian Day*
8. Clam Harbour Beach Sandcastle Competition
9. Vibrancy Festival
10. Hopscotch Halifax
11. HRM Christmas Tree Lighting
12. Dartmouth Christmas Tree Lighting
13. Halifax Explosion Memorial Service
14. Menorah Lighting
15. New Year's Eve

**Culturally significant events are delivered in collaboration with D&I*

In 2021, Regional Council approved funding to create unique events that could act as a downtown enhancement project to help citizens feel safe at outdoor events during and after the COVID-19 pandemic

and to support businesses affected by the pandemic. The Grand Oasis and Dartmouth Summer Series were created and became a major success drawing over 100,000+ people downtown from 2021 to 2023. The Grand Oasis won Event Atlantic's Festival of the Year in 2022. In 2023 Council approved the Summer Series moving forward within the Parks & Recreation budget. The programming and cultural collaborations including Acadian Day, PRIDE, Emancipation Day and Vibrancy were all part of this series.

Since 2021 staff have created significant opportunities for various cultural organizations and artists in HRM by refocusing our event programming to be more reflective of a variety of citizens and traditions. HRM's events now prioritize long-term impact, community engagement, and inclusivity. This strategic shift has strengthened partnerships, expanded outreach, and directly delivered 100+ events in four years, enhancing Halifax's reputation as a vibrant and welcoming Municipality.

Community Led Events Grants

Since 2016, HRM has provided funding for community-led events fostering community pride, heritage, arts, and culture. On average HRM funds an average of 52 events spread across all districts in the Municipality. The program includes four categories outlined below in Table 1:

DISCUSSION

With direction from Council, staff have been reassessing which events should be municipally delivered versus community led and have reviewed the criteria for municipally led events. Both event types are essential, with regional events raising Halifax's profile in a more substantial way, while community-led events have a focus on building local connections and a sense of belonging.

Defining Regional Municipally Delivered Events and Community-Led Local Events

Regional Municipal Events: Municipally led initiatives designed to attract broad audiences, promote Halifax's culture, and drive tourism and economic growth. These events may require significant logistical coordination, including security, transportation, and permitting. These events are directly delivered by the Events division.

Community Events: Grassroots initiatives focused on local traditions and culture, strengthening community identity and fostering resident participation. Led by nonprofit or volunteer groups, these events also help develop new industry professionals. These events are supported by HRM's Event Grant Process and multiple divisions representing the Special Events Taskforce (ie HRP Services, Road Closures and signage support, EHS medical support, Alcohol and Gaming permits, etc).

Municipally Delivered Events (MDE)

Staff recommend the adoption of revised criteria and process, listed below, which must be met to qualify and be included in the annual calendar of municipally delivered events. These criteria will be used moving forward, should there be opportunity to add events to the current successful event calendar. The new criteria aim to ensure equitable access, enhance cultural and community vitality, and optimize municipal resources for events that benefit residents and visitors alike. The guidelines govern the review, selection,

and management of these events to ensure alignment with municipal priorities and values moving forward. To ensure events are meeting the evolving municipal priorities, staff recommends a review of the calendar, every 4 years.

Event Type

The first phase of the event assessment by staff is to ensure events meet the “Event Type” criteria. Staff recommend that ineligible events are defined in accordance with [Administrative Order Number 201 4-020-GOV](#) – respecting grants, as such events such as trade shows or conferences would not be considered to be municipally delivered events. Staff further recommend that the event must align with three or more of the following categories:

Phase 1: Eligibility Assessment (Events must align with a minimum of three to move to phase 2)

- **Cultural** – Celebrates Halifax’s heritage, arts, and diversity.
- **Tourism-Boosting Initiatives** - Measurable and significant economic return. Should reflect the vision of the new Event Strategy
- **Anniversary / Commemorative** – Marks milestone achievements or historical events.
- **Regional** – Appeals to a broad audience, ensuring inclusivity and accessibility.

In consideration of any new events, staff will review the event overview and purpose, branding, marketing plan and overall budget to ensure these categories are significantly aligned with these event types. If the event meets these standards, staff will review the following Criteria to ensure it aligns and fills a gap within the annual calendar.

Phase 2: Event Criteria

Staff recommend that all new events added to the annual calendar align with all five (5) categories:

1. **Municipal Priorities**
 - Reflects HRM’s evolving values and strategic priorities.
 - **Civic Identity:** Contributes to Halifax’s brand as a welcoming, culturally rich, and vibrant city.
 - **Meets a Demand:** Is this event unique to others in the current annual calendar, allowing HRM to diversify event offerings
2. **Accessibility & Inclusion**
 - **Diverse Programming** – Represents Halifax’s cultures and identities.
 - **Accessible Sites:** Accessibility and inclusion are at the forefront of the event site planning
 - **Open & Affordable** – Civic holiday events should be free; ticketed events must offer free access plans for a minimum of 25% of the event capacity. The event must create free access via ticketing applications or non-profit organizations aligned with the festival or event.
3. **Regional & Economic Impact**
 - **Economic Growth** – Supports local businesses, event professionals, and the creative sector.
 - **Tourism & Exposure** – Attracts visitors from within and beyond the region, strengthening Halifax’s reputation as an event destination. Marketing plans targeted beyond the area the event is held.
4. **Feasibility & Safety**
 - **Logistics & Coordination** – Requires municipal infrastructure, permits, and multi-agency collaboration to ensure public safety.
 - **Reputation Management** – High-profile or municipally-created events (e.g., Natal Day, Vibrancy, Hopscotch, New Year’s Eve) should be municipally managed to maintain quality and reputation.

5. **Resource Capacity & Sustainability**

- **Staffing & Budget:** Must fit within available municipal resources and be scheduled to complement, rather than overburden, existing event commitments.
- **Sustainability:** Demonstrates a long-term strategy for growth and community impact.

Review of the Current Event Calendar

Upon review of the current event calendar, staff believe that 11 of the 15 current events listed meet at least three categories within the proposed criteria of the MDE definition. The events that qualify are either well-known established events highly recognized as part of the Municipality’s reputation of delivering large-scale spectacles (e.g. Canada Day, Natal Day, NYE) or they attract new communities and age demographics the municipality was not catering to pre-pandemic and have proven track records as revenue generators and/or community builders (Hopscotch, Emancipation Day/Freedom Festival, Acadian Day and Vibrancy). Existing events that do not meet three (3) or more categories would continue to be legacy events in the annual events calendar based on previous council direction.

Staff believe the event calendar captures a diverse mix of events and if approved should remain with this current calendar until the 2028/29 budget period following the election of the next Council.

Legacy Events

Bedford Days & Dartmouth Tree Lighting

Upon review of all the events, Bedford Days and the Dartmouth Christmas Tree Lighting were specifically dedicated and branded as local celebrations of specific districts and did not meet the identified criteria above. These two events were presented to Council for removal in 2015 as they did not meet the criteria for regional operated events at that time. They were, at that time, approved to remain in the annual calendar based on their legacy as official HRM events for over 20 years. Both events have been under the care and control of event staff from their inception. Based on previous Council direction, staff recommend these two events remain in the Legacy Event category.

Halifax Explosion Memorial & Menorah Lighting

The Halifax Explosion Memorial and Menorah Lighting have also been identified by staff as legacy events that would not meet the new criteria set forward in this report. However, they have been part of the annual event calendar for over 25 years. Both events have a regional reach with significant cultural connection to HRM and the community. Both ceremonies are important commemorations of community and our heritage. Although the events may not require the logistical efforts of our regional festivals, staff believe they bring community members to a central location from across the Province to honour these significant dates.

Additional Options for Municipal Support to Community Led Events

The Strength of Community Led Events

Community led events encourage residents and visitors to celebrate, collaborate, promote and become a part of HRM's special identity; they make HRM a more diverse, vibrant and interesting place to live, work, study, and visit. Volunteerism has always been a vital part of successful community events.

Local events often operate on tight budgets, and volunteers provide invaluable labor without financial compensation. This allows organizers to allocate limited funds toward other essentials like event infrastructure, entertainment, and promotion. When residents volunteer, they feel a deeper sense of ownership and pride in the event, this fosters a collective spirit and strengthens community bonds. The event becomes a reflection of the community's identity and values, making it more meaningful to everyone involved. This social capital is crucial for fostering trust and collaboration in the community, extending well beyond the event itself.

Increased funding to Regional Special Events Grant Program

An increase of \$225,000 to the Regional Special Events Grants program was included in the 2025/26 budget. This increase will see the Regional Special Events Grants expand from \$415,000 to \$640,000. This is the first increase to this fund in over a decade. This supports the increased financial pressure currently facing community led events, will support increasing the quality of events within HRM and allows for new events to receive funding. [The Regional Special Events Grants Program Review](#) information report was on the February 25, 2025 Regional Council agenda as an information item.

In Kind Services

HRM Events provides community led events that present to the Special Events Task Force a municipal point of contact or "Lead". Staff assigned as the "lead" review the logistics plan and provide guidance throughout the event process. The three Senior Coordinators currently assist 150 total events combined.

Staff will be conducting a full review of in-kind service support of events as outlined in the 2025/26 business plan. This review will include the amount of event fees and staff time used on multiple key services for events (e.g. Police Services, Transit fees, Road Closure and Signage, etc). The goal of this review will be to provide opportunities to better understand the municipal in-kind contribution to events and to explore the potential for increased supports for events within HRM. This report will be brought back to council and may impact future budgets.

Events Division Capacity and Jurisdictional Scan of Event Cities

Halifax's Event Division is part of the Canadian Municipal Event Alliance through the Creative Cities Network of Canada. This group represents multiple regions in charge of Events for their area. Through this group staff have learned that Halifax's current offerings of events exceeds the quantity of major hubs like Toronto, Calgary and Vancouver's event divisions. These regions do not have the capacity to host more Municipally Delivered events and rely on Community organizers to create events to grow their event ecosystem. Staff believe the calendar has evolved over the past 10 years from solely celebrating colonial civic holidays into an event plan that honours our historic cultures including Indigenous, Black, Celtic, and Acadian heritage. It's a calendar that also has diversified to focus on youth through progressive musical genres and is honouring our past through the Halifax Explosion Memorial service.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications associated with the recommendations in this report.

RISK CONSIDERATION

The risks considered rate low in continuing the event calendar outlined in Table 2. There is potential reputational risk associated with continuing with legacy events that do not meet the proposed criteria. Organizers of other events could question why those events are municipally delivered events, while theirs are not. Legacy events may mean that staff and Council face ongoing pressure for case-by-case decisions.

The focus of the division is on creating regional scale events that attract residents and visitors from all over the municipality. If staff is focused on community events it could affect the time required to attract major events to the region and build upon the Events Strategy's vision of becoming a national leader in event hosting.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

No community engagement was required.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

No environmental implications were identified.

ALTERNATIVES

Regional Council could choose to:

1. Transition Dartmouth Tree Lightning and Bedford Days by 2027/28, from Municipally Delivered Events to Community-Led Events;
If Council chooses this alternative, staff proposes a phased approach for transitioning Bedford Days and Dartmouth Tree Lighting into community led events. The two (2) programs would be transitioned from the Municipally Delivered Event program category over a two (2) year period. These programs would continue to receive municipal support services from the Special Events Task Force process and would be assigned a civic event lead. In 2027, as a result these events would have to be registered with the Nova Scotia Registry of Joint Stocks or will be accepted by an existing non-for-profit organization and would follow the application process for grants in the same manner as other established community festivals. This would require an increase to the Community Events / Special Projects grant stream of \$40,000 in the 2027-28 budget.
2. Regional Council could choose to make revisions to the criteria for municipally delivered events or the calendar of municipally delivered events. If Council directs this, a staff report would be required.

LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY

Halifax Regional Municipality Charter, S.N.S. 2008, c. 39:

Section 79A

- (1) Subject to subsections (2) to (4), the Municipality may only spend money for municipal purposes if
 - (a) the expenditure is included in the Municipality's operating budget or capital budget or is otherwise authorized by the Municipality;
 - (b) the expenditure is in respect of an emergency under the *Emergency Management Act*; or
 - (c) the expenditure is legally required to be paid.

Administrative Order 2014-021-GOV – The Administrative Order on Regional Events Grants.

Municipally Delivered Events Overview 2025

Staff conducted a review of all Municipally delivered events. The following overview of each event offers a brief summary of the origin, attendance and purpose to host each event.

Event: Bedford Days

Date: June 28 - July 1

Locations: DeWolfe Park, Sunnyside Mall

Event Origin: Bedford Days was approved in the MDE Calendar at amalgamation, coming from the former town of Bedford. It was designated as the large-scale suburban event to remain in the Regional Calendar. A volunteer community committee was formed to develop programming, secure sponsorships, and act as local champions of the festival. HRM Events supports the event with one Senior Events Manager overseeing the event plan annually. The festival has been a legacy event since 1996 and was challenged for removal in 2015 at Regional Council, but was ultimately retained.

HRM Operating Budget: \$20,000

External Sponsorship Cash: \$40,000

External Sponsorship In-Kind: 10,000

Event: KANATA: HFX Canada Day

Date: July 1

Locations: Emera Oval, Grand Parade, Halifax Waterfront, Sullivans Pond, Public Gardens, Ferry Terminal Park, Alderney Landing

Event Origin: KANATA: HFX Canada Day was designed to celebrate Canada's national holiday with an emphasis on Indigenous storytelling, history, and reconciliation. The event includes live performances, cultural exhibits, and fireworks, aiming to provide an inclusive and educational experience while maintaining traditional festivities. Over the years Canada Day in Halifax

has been recognized as the most attended celebration in Atlantic Canada, hosting well over 100,000 people annually. The event has attracted international artists to the region including the most attended concert in Downtown history with Deadmau5 on the Commons (Canada 150 celebrations).

HRM Operating Budget: \$75,000

External Sponsorship Cash: \$40,000

External Sponsorship In-Kind: \$50,000

Event: Halifax-Dartmouth Natal Day

Date: August 1 - 4

Location: Halifax Waterfront, Dartmouth Waterfront, Sullivans Pond, Lake Banook, Public Gardens, Multiple Streets during the Parade and more

Event Origin: Natal Day is one of Halifax's longest-lasting celebrations, marking the founding of Halifax-Dartmouth with a long weekend of events, including parades, concerts, fireworks, and community activities. The event brings together both sides of the harbour in a joint celebration of civic pride. The African Nova Scotian Music Association's Freedom Festival is a highlight of the weekend, celebrating Emancipation Day through live music and community vendors all day long. This is

Event: Clam Harbour Beach Sandcastle Competition

Date: August 23

Location: Clam Harbour Beach

Event Origin: The Clam Harbour Beach Sandcastle Competition has been an annual tradition drawing artists, families, and competitors from across the region. This unique event transforms the beach into an artistic showcase of elaborate sand

sculptures, attracting thousands of spectators each year. It is one of the rural area's largest celebrations of the year and the most attended beach event annually in HRM.

External Sponsorship In-Kind: \$10,000

Event: Hopscotch Festival

Date: October 16-18

Location: Lighthouse Arts Centre, Rogers Square, Grand Parade and various music venues

Event Origin: Created by the Municipality in 2010 alongside local artists to support a gap in youth based programming in the annual events calendar. the Hopscotch Festival is Halifax's premier hip-hop festival, designed to celebrate music, culture, live muralists and dancers. The event features concerts, workshops, and community engagement initiatives, fostering local talent and connecting Halifax to the international hip-hop scene. It has been a sold out event all fifteen years of its existence.

Allowing youth to celebrate together annually.

External Sponsorship In-Kind: \$15,000

Event: TD Dartmouth Tree Lighting

Date: November 29

Location: Sullivans Pond, Alderney Landing

Event Origin: The Dartmouth Tree Lighting is a community-centered event that kicks off the holiday season with festive lights, entertainment, and family-friendly activities. It is a staple holiday tradition aimed at fostering local pride and bringing residents together in a shared celebration.

HRM Operating Budget: \$20,000

External Sponsorship In-Kind: \$5,000

Event: Halifax Tree Lighting

Date: November 22

Location: Grand Parade

Event Origin: The Halifax Tree Lighting is a large-scale holiday event featuring performances, interactive activities, and the official lighting of the city's Christmas tree. The event attracts families and visitors, creating a festive atmosphere in the heart of the city. Annually featuring international childrens entertainers (ie Paw Patrol, Dora The Explorer, etc) the Halifax Tree Lighting has become a major tourist attraction and important part of kicking off Downtown Halifax's holiday shopping season.

Event: Halifax Explosion Memorial Service

Date: December 6

Location: Fort Needham, Bell Tower

Event Origin: This memorial service commemorates the Halifax Explosion of 1917, one of the most significant disasters in Canadian history. The event provides a space for reflection and remembrance, honoring the victims and first responders who played crucial roles in the aftermath.

HRM Operating Budget: \$5,000

Event: Menorah Lighting

Date: TBD

Location: Grand Parade

Event Origin: The Menorah Lighting celebrates Hanukkah with a public ceremony that includes traditional blessings, music, and community participation. The event promotes cultural awareness and inclusivity within the broader Halifax community. The celebration continues in Halifax Hall for families to gather following the lighting of the Menorah.

Event: New Year's Eve @ Grand Parade

Date: December 31

Location: Grand Parade

Event Origin: New Year's Eve at Grand Parade is Halifax's signature year-end celebration, featuring live entertainment, fireworks, and a vibrant atmosphere to ring in the new year. The event draws large crowds and is a key moment for the city's event calendar.

HRM Operating Budget: \$80,000

This series includes National Indigenous Peoples Day, OPEN Streets Dartmouth, Desi Community Summer Fest, Emancipation Day, Acadian Day, a PRIDE event, a collaboration with the Jamaican Cultural Association, Vibrancy Fest, and the Sullivans Pond Summer Series. Each event within the series highlights unique cultural traditions, music, and artistic expression, fostering inclusivity and community engagement throughout the summer. The series provides a platform for our Export ready local talent, strengthens cultural awareness, and supports the growth of Halifax-Dartmouth as a hub for diverse celebrations.
